Turkey's First Community Foundation is Established

Turkey's first community foundation, Bolu Community Foundation (BCF), was established in Bolu (a town of approximately 85.000 inhabitants, about 250 km from Istanbul) and presents an important milestone in Turkey's third sector. The Bolu Community Foundation (BCF) aims to promote the well-being of Bolu by supporting critical projects put forth by non profit organizations which address the critical social and economic development of the community. Turkey's first community foundation, BCF, was established by a gorup of local business and civil society leaders with the technical support of TUSEV (Third Sector Foundation of Turkey) as part of its new program area on promoting philanthropy and social investment in Turkey.

Civil Society Law Reform

Constitutional Court Decision Lifts Ban on Membership for Foundations

The Constitutional Court of Turkey annulled third paragraph of Article 101 of Turkish Civil Code, which stated that "there is no membership status in foundations". The decision allows foundations, who were previously not allowed to get new members after their establishment, to acquire members freely as of June 28, 2008.

Results of Survey on the EU Accession Process and Civil Society

241 people responded to our survey question "Do you think that the EU accession process will help develop the Turkish civil society?" While 43,5% said yes, 56,5% answered no, indicating that they do not think the EU accession process will help develop Turkish civil society. Fourteen civil society organizations from all over the world joined forces to battle land degradation as part of a European Union funded project named DryNet, including TEMA Foundation of Turkey. Drynet's aim is to strengthen the organizations that work to address degradation and poverty in the frame of strategic development. Drynet provides farmer cooperatives, local groups, women's organizations, unions and civil society organizations with essential information regarding land use and seeks to influence degradation policies by attracting the attention of policy makers and other key stakeholders.
